Dear Attorney General [Last Name],

I am writing as a concerned citizen to demand immediate action against K-12 public schools in our state that are permitting or facilitating student walkouts to protest U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). These unauthorized absences not only disrupt education but also expose children to significant risks, neglect the schools' fundamental duties, and open the door to legal liabilities for viewpoint discrimination. It is imperative that your office investigates these practices and holds school administrators accountable under applicable state laws to protect our children's safety and ensure equal treatment under the law.

First and foremost, student walkouts are not constitutionally protected activities in K-12 schools. While students retain certain First Amendment rights on campus, as established in landmark cases like *Tinker v. Des Moines*, these rights do not extend to disruptive actions such as leaving school grounds without permission. Courts have consistently held that schools may regulate student speech if it substantially disrupts the educational environment or infringes on the rights of others. Walkouts, by their nature, involve skipping classes and often lead to unexcused absences, which schools are legally entitled to discipline without violating free speech protections. Permitting such actions undermines the compulsory attendance laws that require students to be in school, turning what should be a structured learning environment into a platform for unchecked activism.

Moreover, by allowing these walkouts, schools are recklessly endangering children. K-12 students, many of whom are minors, are participating in public protests where they could face traffic hazards, encounters with strangers, or even violence from counter-protesters. Schools have a legal duty of care to protect students during school hours, and failing to prevent or supervise these exits constitutes negligence. If a student is injured during a walkout that the school knowingly permitted, the district could face substantial liability for failing to foresee and mitigate preventable harm. This is not mere speculation; legal precedents show that schools can be held accountable when they do not adequately safeguard students from foreseeable risks. Our children's safety must take precedence over political expression, and your office has a responsibility to enforce laws that prevent such endangerment.

In addition to safety concerns, schools engaging in this practice are negligent in their ethical and professional duties. Educators are entrusted with fostering a neutral, inclusive learning environment, not encouraging truancy for partisan causes. This erodes public trust in our education system and diverts resources from teaching core subjects to managing avoidable disruptions. State oversight is needed to remind schools of their primary role: educating students, not facilitating political agendas.

Finally, these schools risk lawsuits for discriminating against other students based on their viewpoint. If a school permits walkouts for anti-ICE protests but denies or punishes similar expressions for opposing views, such as protests supporting immigration enforcement or other conservative causes, this constitutes unlawful viewpoint discrimination under the First Amendment. Public schools must apply policies neutrally, without favoring one political perspective over another. Such bias not only stifles diverse opinions but also invites civil rights claims from affected students and parents. Your office should proactively investigate these disparities to prevent costly litigation and uphold equal protection for all.

I urge you to take swift action: Launch investigations into schools reported for allowing these walkouts, issue guidance reinforcing compulsory attendance and neutrality laws, and pursue enforcement measures against negligent administrators. Our state cannot afford to let political activism compromise student safety, education, or fairness. Please respond within 30 days outlining the steps your office will take to address this pressing issue.
